Executive Director's Report

The Children's Center had a very busy year in 2016, which is clearly reflected in the numbers:

- ◆ 19 children in our Autism Program.
- ◆ 60 children in our Behavior Support Program.
- ◆ 40 children in Child Care.
- ◆ 80 children in Occupational Therapy.
- ◆ 30 caregivers in Parent Education & Support
- ◆ 9 children in Rehabilitative Community Support
- ◆ 65 in Special Education Settings
- ◆ 98 children in Speech & Language Therapy
- ◆ 235 children in Targeted Case Management

In particular, the number of children participating in our behavior support classrooms increased from 33 to 60 in one year. Most children in these classrooms have significant trauma experiences resulting in feelings of acute anxiety and anger, which often result in disruptive and sometimes aggressive behaviors. Our goal is to help those children find healthy outlets for their feelings and learn behaviors that will not harm themselves or others.

Substance use within families, the effects of prenatal drug use, mental health issues, and other challenges, sadly, impact many children in these programs. The increase in numbers reflects the problems children live with every day and perhaps more specifically, shows the increasing impact opioid abuse is having on our communities.

We anticipate 2017 will also be a very busy and exciting year. Our playground renovation will be completed by late summer. In early fall, we're leasing a portable building to allow for the addition of three classroom spaces.

Much of what we do for children and families is not possible without the generous support we receive from our central Maine community. Thanks to all of you that have helped us continue to provide services and support to very special children. We're very grateful.

The Children's Center's mission is to meet the needs of all children by offering quality programs that encourage individual growth, provide support for families, and promote inclusion in the community.

Children's Center Programs

Parent Education and Support Groups: Education and Support Groups allow parents and caregivers to learn about topics most relevant to raising a young child with special needs and seek support from others experiencing similar challenges.

Rehabilitative Community Support: Young children receive focused skill development in home and community environments in order to increase independence in functional living skills and promote consistency across all natural settings.

Targeted Case Management: Highly skilled professionals work directly with children with special needs and their families in the home and community by providing families with support and resources needed to access services.

Child Care: Full time child care for children six-weeks to five-years-old in inclusive early education settings from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. year round.

Special Education Services: Children participate in individualized instruction focused on pre-academic skills and kindergarten readiness in a specialized classroom or inclusive setting depending on strengths and needs of the child.

Occupational Therapy: Licensed Occupational Therapists and Certified Assistants provide children with positive, fun activities to help them develop in the areas of self-help, fine and gross motor skills, oral motor, and play.

Speech and Language Therapy: Licensed Speech and Language Therapists and Certified Assistants help children develop their speech, language, communication, and oral motor skills to promote success in other programs, services, and settings.

Autism Program: Children diagnosed with autism receive one-on-one treatment services in a specialized setting overseen by a Board Certified Behavioral Analyst (BCBA) in order to increase independence and readiness for an inclusive early education classroom and/or public school setting.

Behavioral Support Program: A Licensed Clinical Social Worker oversees the highly structured classrooms focused on specific skills related to emotional regulation, behavioral management, and/or interpersonal skills for children with a behavioral health diagnosis in order to improve their ability to participate in a less restrictive environment.
